- Their name describes what they do, which is to point out game birds; they have had this job description for centuries
- They are great dogs for runners due to their speed and agility
- Coat comes in several colors, which can occur as a solid splash or in a pattern

11. Field Spaniel

- Sex determines the height, which can range from 17"-18"
- Close cousins to the Cocker Spaniel and Springer Spaniel
- Sweet and docile when lying around but vigorous when playing or in the field
- Hunting companions
- Coat is shiny with long, feathery ears that frame a face that conveys intelligence
- Great with kids, other mammals, and respond to training

12. Non-sporting Breeds

- This is a diverse group of dogs that come in many different sizes, coats, personalities, and overall appearance
- Even though these breeds are not into "sports," they do require exercise for physical and mental well-being

13. Boston Terrier

- Height: 15"-17"
- Due to this breed's impeccable manners, it earned the nickname "The American Gentleman"
- Lively little companion with a recognizable "tight tuxedo jacket," sporty but compact body, and a friendly face
- Big, round eyes
- Great breed for city dwellers
- Have a jaunty, rhythmic walk

14. Bulldog

- Height: 14"-15"
- Docile, loyal companions that adapt to town or country living
- Bodies are thick-set, low-slung, and well-muscled
- The head has loose skin, a furrowed brow, pushed in nose, small ears, and a bottom jaw that juts out
- The jaw shape creates hanging chops on either side
- Have a distinctive rolling gait
- Heat will bother this breed

15. French Bulldog

- Height: 11"-13"
- The world's most popular in the small-dog breeds, especially with city dwellers
- Is known for its one-of-a-kind appearance with its large bat ears
- Also known as Frenchies
- Do not bark much
- Due to their alertness, this breed makes excellent watchdogs
- Do not require much exercise
- Gets along with animals and humans

16. Miniature and Standard Poodles

- Miniature Height: 15" or shorter
- Standard Height: 15" or taller
- Has a low-allergen coat
- Coat can be black, white, or apricot
- Can be groomed in either continental clip for shows or sporting clip
- Athletic, very smart, and remarkably versatile

17. Dalmatian

- Height: 19"-24"
- Known for its spotted coat
- Also known for their unique job description as "coach dog," which means they accompanied the horse-drawn carriages of nobles, Romani people, and firefighters
 - Guarded the horses and coaches
- Due to their muscular hindquarters, this breed is built to go the distance with a smooth, effortless gait
- Strong athlete with great stamina, which makes them a wonderful companion for hikers and runners

18. Chinese Shar-Pei

- Height: 18"-20"
- Has what is described as a broad "hippopotamus" muzzle; a blue-black tongue, and small, sunken eyes with an angry expression
- Ears are tiny triangular shapes on each side of a face that is covered with loose skin that falls around the neck and shoulders
- Shar-Pei literally translates to "sand skin," which describes the coat texture and color
- Must receive early training and socialization to prevent serious behavioral problems
- Very loyal and intelligent

19. American Eskimo Dog

- Height depends on type of American Eskimo Dog
 - Toy: 9"-12"
 - Miniature: 12"-15"
 - Standard: 15"-19"
- Has a sparkling white coat with a lion-like ruff around the chest and shoulders
- Smiling face with a black nose, lips, and eye-rims
- Tail is plumed over the back
- Gait is bold
- Eskies, as they are known, are social animals that can develop behavior problems if neglected or not trained
- Very eager to please and will insist on being part of the family

20. Hound Breeds

This is another diverse group that contains dog breeds known for two traits.

1. Great sense of smell
 - While all dog breeds have an acute ability to pick up smells, hound breeds are the Olympians of this skill
 2. Phenomenal gift of stamina
 - Allows them to relentlessly run down their quarry
- One downfall of this breed comes from them howling or baying
 - Many dogs in this category bay when they find prey
 - Prior to getting one of these breeds, listen to the dog to see if this vocalization is something you can live with

21. Basset Hound

- Height: Up to 15"
- Can sometimes be stubborn but also charming

- Known for a large, domed head that features extremely long, velvety ears; sad eyes; and a wrinkled brow
- Some may even say they look like a sad clown
- Built more for endurance, not speed
- Their nose is well known for its uncanny ability to pick up a scent
- Also known for their loud, ringing barks when they are on the trail

22. Beagle

- 2 varieties:
 - Under 13" tall at the shoulder
 - Between 13" and 15" tall
- Bred to hunt in a pack
- Loving and lovable, which is why they make a wonderful family pet
- By breeders, this breed is called "merry"
- Known for their adorable face with brown or hazel eyes and low, hound ears that are low set on a broad face

23. Bloodhound

- Height is determined by sex and can range from 23"-27"
- Known as a "sleuth hound" due to its ability to find lost people
- Famous features:
 - Long, wrinkled face with loose skin
 - Huge, drooping ears
 - Warm, deep-set eyes that create the solemn expression
- Are known to be "pack dogs," which love the companionship of other dogs
- Love walks but scents can make them hard to control
- They are also droolers, which can be a problem

24. Greyhound

- Depending on sex, this breed's height can range from 27"-30"
- Champion sprinter
- Gentle, noble, and sweet tempered
- Built for speed with a narrow, aerodynamic skull and shock-absorbing pads on the feet
- Have an inverted S shape that creates a deep chest and a tightly tucked waist

25. Irish Wolfhound

- Depending on the sex, the height can range from 30"-32"
- Tallest of all AKC breeds
- At one time, this breed was viewed as a fearless big-game hunter that could take down a wolf in a single fight

- Rough, hard coat that comes in many colors
- Just the sight of them can deter intruders
- Patient with kids and other dogs but should be supervised due to their size

26. Bluetick Coonhound

- Depending on the sex, this breed's height can range from 21"-27"
- Known to be speedy and compact nighttime hunters
- Their name comes from the mottled or "ticked" black-and-blue pattern, which is highlighted by a glossy coat
- Loves affection and is deeply devoted to those who give it
- When hunting, this breed is known for its bark, which includes baying, bawling, and chopping
- They live to hunt; if they're not allowed an outlet for this natural desire, this breed can develop behavior problems

27. American Foxhound

- Depending on the sex, this breed's height can range from 21"-25"
- Closely associated with Revolutionary War heroes and the estates of old Virginia
- Known for their speed, endurance, and work ethic
- Good-natured and low-maintenance, but they need a lot of exercise
- If they do not get enough exercise, they can become destructive and/or depressed
- They also have a loud bawling bark that can be a problem with neighbors
- Not for a novice owner

28. Dachshund

- 2 sizes:
 - Standard height is 8"-9"
 - Miniature height is 5"-6"
- Has a famously long, low silhouette
- Alert expression
- Not built for distance running, leaping, or strenuous swimming but are tireless hunters
- Small dog with a "big dog" bark, which makes them great watchdogs
- Bred to be independent hunters of dangerous prey

29. Afghan Hound

- Height: 25"-27"
- Most eye-catching of all dog breeds
- Known to be silly at times and profoundly loyal
- Their thick, silky, flowing coat is not only for show but helps them deal with the harsh climate of Afghanistan, which is where this breed originated from

- Built for a long day of hunting
- Have large paw pads that act as shock absorbers

30. Herding Breeds

- This group was established in 1983
- Prior to 1983, dogs that controlled animals in a herding way were placed in the working group
- While many in this group will never see sheep, ducks, or cattle, this does not mean that their herding instincts stop
- Many in this group will try to herd their owners, children, and even pillows
- While this can be a challenge, dogs in this group make excellent companions and love training exercises

31. Border Collie

- Depending on sex, this breed is between 18" and 22" in height
- This breed is a workaholic and very energetic, which can be a problem for owners who do not have the time or energy to keep them active
- Considered medium-sized herders
- Known for their intense gaze called the "herding eye"
- Among the canine kingdom's most agile, balanced, and durable dogs
- Great for agility, herding, and obedience work

32. German Shepherd

- Depending on sex, this breed's height can range from 22"-26"
- Known as the finest breed for all-purpose work and can learn commands for several tasks
- When viewed in outline, this breed is a picture of smooth, graceful curves versus angles
- Their natural gait is a free-an-easy trot but can easily reach great speeds
- Also known for their character, which can be described as loyal, confident, and courageous
 - This means they will put their life on the line for loved ones

33. Old English Sheepdog

- Depending on sex, this breed's height can range from 21" and up
- Archetypical shaggy dog that is famous for its profuse coat and peek-a-boo hairdo
- The coat is double in layers
- Gait is bear-like and they have a mellowed-out personality
- Eyes can be dark brown, blue, or one of each
- Great with children and are protective playmates
- Also known for their loud, ringing bark, which makes them great watchdogs

34. Shetland Sheepdog

- Height: 13"-16"
- Also known as a Sheltie
- Long coat that is harsh and straight with a dense undercoat
- Long, wedge-shaped head
- Small, three-quarter erect ears
- Deep-chested with a level-back torso
- They do bark and tend to be reserved around strangers, which is why they make great watchdogs
- Easy to train and are world-class competitors in obedience, agility, and herding trials

35. Cardigan Welsh Corgi

- Height: 10.5"-12.5"
- Every characteristic of this breed makes it perfectly suited for moving cattle
- Powerful worker and deceptively speedy
- Cardis, as they are known, are trainable, faithful, and vigilant guardians
- Sound off with a "big dog" bark
- If well socialized, this breed is fond of kids and other pets
- Athletic, hardy herders that love the outdoors
- To thrive, they must receive both mental stimulation and physical activity

36. Working Breeds

- Dogs in this group were bred to perform certain jobs such as guarding property, pulling sleds, and performing water rescues
- Breeds in this group are quick to learn, are intelligent, and make solid companions
- Due to their size and strength, dogs in this group are not suitable for average families
- To prevent issues, working breeds must be properly trained

37. Boxer

- Depending on sex, this breed's height can range from 21.5"-25"
- Boxers have been among one of America's most popular dog breeds for a very long time
- Muscles ripple underneath a short, tight-fitting coat
- Dark brown eyes and wrinkled forehead give their face an alert, curious look
- Just like their common name, Boxers move like athletes with a forward thrust
- Protective by nature
- Great as watchdogs and with kids

38. Bullmastiff

- Depending on sex, this breed's height can range from 24"-27"
- A cross between the Bulldog and Mastiff
- Bred to hold poachers in England
- Not as large as a Mastiff but it does have a large, broad head with dark eyes
- High-set, V-shaped ears and a broad, deep muzzle
- World-class protector and family companion
- Must train and socialize while young so that they can be controlled

39. Doberman Pinscher

- Depending on sex, this breed's height can range from 24"-28"
- One of dogkind's noblemen with a sleek and powerful physique and intense intelligence
- Coat is sleek but substantial and glistens in the sun
- Colors include black, blue, red, or fawn with rust markings
- Head is considered a noble wedge shape
- Athletic and, if well-conditioned, will deter all but the most unwise intruders

40. Bernese Mountain Dog

- Depending on sex, this breed's height can range from 23"-27.5"
- Sturdy worker that is also very sweet and affectionate
- Thrives in cold weather and can multitask on farms and pastures, making them invaluable in Switzerland
- Gets along with humans (including children) but many times will become attached to one lucky human
- While their coat is long, it is also tri-colored in jet black, clear white, and rust; this plus the markings on their face creates this breed's trademark

41. Alaskan Malamute

- Depending on sex, this breed's height can range from 23"-25"
- Heavy-duty worker of spitz type
- Recognizable by its well-furred, plumed tail that is carried over its back
- Body shape indicates their origin as arctic sled dogs
- Almond-shaped, brown eyes show affectionate sparkle, which hints at their love of snuggling
- Pack animal
- If the Alaskan Malamute does not respect you, it will own you

42. Terrier Breeds

- This group consists of dogs from fairly small to very large
- Regardless of size, the terrier breeds are known for their feisty nature
- Terriers normally have no tolerance for other animals, including dogs
- Bred to hunt and kill vermin
- Have a wiry coat that requires special grooming called “stripping”
- Stripping keeps the characteristic appearance of the coat that is a trademark of this group
- These dogs have an attitude, which makes them ready for any spirited argument
- Terrier breeds make engaging pets, but be prepared for their lively personality

43. Rat Terrier

- Height: 10”-18”
- An American original whose name was coined by Teddy Roosevelt
- As the name implies, they exterminate rats
- Comes in two sizes: Standard and miniature
- Happy dogs that are playful and portable companions
- Have a smooth, shiny coat that comes in a variety of pied patterns, which means large patches of one or more on a white background

44. Russell Terrier

- Height: 10”-12”
- Developed by England’s “Sporting Parson” for use in foxhunts
- Look like a plush toy
- Defining characteristics:
 - Dark, almond-shaped eyes
 - Mobile, V-shaped ears that support an intelligent expression
- Three coat types that are mostly white with markings that can be tan, black, or both
- Gait demonstrates their innate confidence

45. Scottish Terrier

- Height: 10”
- Independent, confident companion with high spirits
- Dignified, almost human-like character
- Their persistence earned them the nickname “Diehard”
- The well-known silhouette is that of a short-legged terrier with distinctive beard, legs, and lower body
- Hunting instinct remains strong, which can complicate life for neighborhood cats
- Can be crabby around other dogs

46. Miniature Schnauzer

- Height: 12"-14"
- Smallest of the three Schnauzer breeds
- Long-lived and low-shedding
- Bushy beard and eyebrows give miniature schnauzers a human-like expression
- Great all-around farm dog and ratter
- At home both in the city and on the farm
- Make great watchdogs

47. Border Terrier

- Height: 12"-15"
- "Otter-shaped head"
- Longer legs than other small terriers
- Equally at home in the city and country
- Known to be "hard as nails" when working
- Gets along with other dogs but their hunting instincts can be triggered if cats and/or squirrels cross their path

48. Toy Breeds

- This group contains dogs that are small but full of personality
- Their small size makes them great for city dwellers and people without much living space
- Even though they are small, they still have the same issues as larger breeds, such as shedding
- For every breed of dog, there is a toy breed
- Many owners take comfort in the fact that it is easier to control a 10-pound dog versus a 100-pound dog
- While this is true, it is just as important that your toy breed receives proper training to prevent problems

49. Cavalier King Charles Spaniel

- Height: 12"-13"
- Combines the best of two worlds with the gentle attentiveness of a toy breed and the athleticism of a sporting spaniel
- Has two trademarks:
 - Sweet, gentle face
 - Adding to this look are the large, round eyes that melt the heart
 - Silky, rich coat
 - Coat can be one of four distinct color varieties
- Adaptable
- Gets along with children and other dogs

- Adapts to activity level, which makes it a great match for both active owners and homebodies

50. Chihuahua

- Height: 5"-8"
- National symbol of Mexico
- Called "purse" dogs
- One of the oldest breeds in the Americas
- An apple-shaped head is the breed's trademark
- Very loyal and charming
- Has a big dog attitude
- Great for city dwellers but too small for children who like to roughhouse
- Does not do well in cold weather

51. Chinese Crested

- Height: 11"-13"
- Spotted pink skin and spiky crested hairdo
- Furry socks and feathery tail
- Can be hairless or coated
- Hairless variety has smooth, soft skin and tufts of hair on their head, tail, and ankles
- Coated variety is referred to as "powderpuff"
 - This type's skin is covered with soft, silky hair
- Hairless Chinese Crested has no "doggy odor"
- Ultra affectionate to humans
- Both types love humans and pets

52. Maltese

- Height: 7"-9"
- A very old breed that can be traced to biblical times
- Known for their show-stopping, floor-length fur that is long, straight, and silky
- Fur is low-shedding
- Have big, dark eyes and a black nose that looks like a gumdrop
- Very adaptable and wonderful watchdogs
- Athletic on the agility course

53. Pekingese

- Compact toy companion that has a regal background and a characteristic rolling gait
- One of several breeds created for the ruling class of China
- Height: 6"-9"

- Create a close bond with their favorite human
- Bred to live in palaces, they can be very independent
- This breed is opinionated according to Peke people, or individual who own Pekingese
- Very alert, which makes them great watchdogs
- Will tolerate children but will not stand for roughhousing

54. Toy Poodle

- Height: No more than 10"
- Has a low-allergen coat
- Coat can be black, white, or apricot
- Can be groomed in either continental clip for shows or sporting clip
- Athletic, very smart, and remarkably versatile

What Does My Dog Really Need? – Answer Key

1. Feeding and Stages of Life

- Dogs have three stages of life, which include puppy, adult, and senior
- Each stage has its own feeding requirements, but dogs do not mature at the same rate

2. Types of Dogs and Maturity

- Each type or breed of dog grows from a puppy to an adult at a different rate
- This rate will determine when you can move up from puppy to adult food

3. Toy or Mini Breed

- Mature into an adult at 9 months of age
- On average, this also equates to around 10 lbs. or less

4. Small Breed

- Matures at 10 months
- Mature weight is between 10 and 20 lbs.

5. Medium Breed

- Matures around 12 months
- Mature weight of a medium breed is 20-50 lbs.

6. Large and Giant Breeds

- Takes 24 months to mature
- At mature age, this breed will weigh over 50 lbs.

7. Beyond the Breed, Is My Dog a Puppy, Adult, or Senior?

- When a dog goes from a puppy to an adult is determined by breed, but there are some general age breakdowns
- Puppies are less than a year old depending on breed
- Adults are 1-2 years
- Seniors are 7 years or older

8. **Feeding Requirements**

- As with humans, dogs at different stages of life have special dietary requirements
- Dogs with clinical conditions require special diets that address their unique needs

9. **Nutrition for Growing Puppies**

- The puppy stage has the highest nutrition requirements of any of the three life stages
- This is referred to as the “growth diet”
- Puppies require 2-4 times more energy per pound of weight compared to adult dogs
- By the time the puppy reaches maturity, it will have increased its birth weight 40-to-50 fold
- Puppies should be fed a dog food formulated specifically for puppies
- Food formulated for puppies is higher in calories and protein level
- Puppy food also contains fatty acids, which support brain and vision development
- Also contains calcium and phosphorus for proper bone growth
- Antioxidants are added to support the immune system

10. **Feeding Puppies**

- Regardless of breed, a young puppy’s stomach is small
- They can only handle a small amount of food at a time
- To meet their caloric intake, young puppies should be fed three times each day
- Once puppies are 4-5 months old, they should be fed twice each day
- While the definition of maturity is different for each breed, as the puppy gets closer to adulthood its calorie requirement with decrease

11. **Nutrition for Adult Dogs**

- As the dog enters adulthood, you will need to use adult-formulated dog food to meet their new needs
- While the kibble size or size of dog food pieces was small when the dog was a puppy, you may notice that adult kibble is bigger
- If you have a toy or small breed, an adult dog food designed for their small mouths may be required
- Referred to as the “maintenance diet”
- Diet should be complete and balanced, contain quality ingredients, and be highly digestible
- Doing this will allow your dog to have a healthy coat and skin, healthy digestion, and a healthy immune system
- There are many factors to consider when looking for feeding recommendations
- Factors such as breed size, lifestyle, spay/neuter status, and individual metabolism affect feeding requirements
- Dogs that are pregnant, nursing, and/or hard working (guard, hunting, racing, herding breeds) will have higher nutritional requirements

12. Adult Dog “Maintenance Diet”

- A good “maintenance diet” should contain five ingredients:
 1. High-quality protein that helps maintain a lean body mass, is a preferred energy source, and has a minimum of 34% ME
 2. Highly digestible ingredients
 3. Correct energy density (calories)
 4. Antioxidants to support the immune system
 5. Omega 3 and fatty acids for a shiny coat and healthy skin

13. Nutrition for Senior Dogs

- The average lifespan of a dog is 13 years and, while the age of a senior dog will differ between breeds, the average senior dog is 7 years old
- There are many signs that your dog is a “senior,” including changes in:
 - Metabolism
 - Activity level
 - Body condition
 - Skin
 - Coat
 - Immune, organ, sensory, or brain function
 - Digestion
 - Oral health
- A senior dog diet is designed to “optimize health and body condition”
- To optimize health and body composition, senior dog food should contain 6 components:
 1. A specific, high-quality protein to calorie ratio that avoids protein loss in tissue
 2. Slightly lower in fat compared to the adult formula, which will help maintain a health body condition
 3. Higher level of antioxidants, which will provide more support for an aging immune system
 4. Highly digestible nutrients that aid aging digestive tracts
 5. Adapted energy levels that support a healthy weight while protecting the joints
 6. Adequate levels of Omega 3s for joint support and function

14. Beyond the Food Bowl

- Regardless of age, a dog will require a food and water bowl plus other items that provide safety and shelter
- A pet carrier or travel harness will make it easier and safer for you to take your dog to the veterinarian

15. Dog Supply List

- Collar for holding the dog tags (but not a leash)
- Harness you can hook a leash to so that you can comfortably and safely walk your dog
- Leash allows you to control your dog as you stroll around town

- Brush to keep them looking their best
- Nail clippers to save the floors in your home and aid in paw care
- Poop bags to pick up the waste from your canine, a healthy habit for the environment and other dogs in the neighborhood
- Pee pads for when you train your new family member
- Comfy bed that makes them feel at home
- Crate to keep your new companion in one place while you are not at home
- Gate to keep your dog out of certain parts of the house
- Doggie-approved toys to keep your canine friend occupied

16. Special Supplies for Dogs

- If you have a female dog, you will want to get “period pads” or diapers to collect the flow
- Diapers for senior dogs that have leakage problems

17. Not an Indoor Dog

- If your new friend is going to be an outside companion only or outside with you a lot, then you will need a dog house and/or a kennel
- Either one of these should provide shelter, safety, food, and water

1. The **Definition** of a Canine Disease is....

- A canine disease is any harmful deviation from the normal structural or functional state of an organism, generally associated with certain signs and symptoms and differing in nature from physical injury
- Simply put, a canine disease is a variation in the health of the dog that shows certain signs and symptoms that are different from physical injury
- Normally caused by a virus or bacteria

2. The **Definition** of a Canine Parasite is...

- A canine parasite is an organism that lives in or on an organism of another species (host) and benefits by deriving nutrients at the other organism's expense
- Simply put, a canine parasite is an organism that lives in or on a dog (host) and receives nutrients from that dog
- This is a one-sided relationship in which the only one who benefits is the parasite
- The parasite is dependent on the dog for its survival

3. **Canine Distemper**

- Contagious disease caused by a virus
- Virus attacks the respiratory, gastrointestinal, and nervous systems
- Virus is found in wildlife
- Transmitted from one infected animal to another by air, food, and water
- Can be transferred from mother to babies
- Symptoms:
 - Watery to pus-like discharge from eyes
 - Fever
 - Nasal discharge
 - Coughing
 - Tiredness
 - Reduced appetite
 - Vomiting
- As the nervous system is infected, dogs will walk in circles, their muscles will twitch, and they may experience complete or partial paralysis
- Footpads can thicken, which is called "hard pad disease"

- Most of the time it is fatal
- Prevent with vaccinations

4. Canine Influenza

- Very contagious viral infection
- Influenza viruses belong to the family Orthomyxoviridae
- Presently there are two strains in the U.S., which include H3N8 and H3N2
- Transmitted through droplets or aerosols containing respiratory secretions from coughing, barking, and sneezing
- Can spread due to close contact with infected dogs and indirectly through kennels, water and food bowls, collars, and leashes
- Can live on a surface for 48 hours, clothing 24 hours, and hands 12 hours
- Incubation period is 5 days with symptoms normally showing up between 2 and 3 days
- Symptoms include coughing, sneezing, and/or a runny nose
- Lab tests are required for proper diagnosis
- Treat by keeping the dog hydrated and eating
- In 2-3 days the dog will be fine, but sometimes secondary problems arise
- Treat with antimicrobials for bacteria and viruses along with nonsteroidal, anti-inflammatory medication for fever
- Prevent by making sure your dog is healthy and keeping everything clean

5. Canine Parvovirus

- Highly contagious virus that affects all dogs, but unvaccinated dogs and puppies younger than four months old are at the most risk
- Affects the gastrointestinal tract, which is why it can spread through exposure to feces that contains the virus
- Exposure can occur anywhere:
 - Kennels
 - Food and water bowls
 - Collars
 - Leashes
 - Clothing
 - Shoes
 - Dogs can carry it on their feet and transfer it to other areas by just walking
- Signs include loss of appetite, lethargy, abdominal pain, and bloating along with bloody stool
- If left untreated, the dog will die of septic shock
- Most deaths occur 48-72 hours following the signs
- No test is available so clinic signs are used
- No drug for treatment is available
- 50% of dogs who get this will die even with treatment, which consists of keeping the dog hydrated
- Prevention is the only option and involves vaccination and good hygiene

6. Kennel Cough

- Caused by a combination of viruses and bacteria
- Very contagious
- Can go several days without showing any symptoms, which include a snotty nose and a dry, hacking cough
- There are vaccines, but they are not part of the normal shot series
- Consult a veterinarian about vaccines
- Prevent by keeping sick dogs home
- Treat with antibiotics

7. Rabies

- World rabies day: September 28
- Rabies is spread by saliva transferred through a bite or into an open wound from an infected animal
- Vaccination and keeping your dog away from wildlife are the only prevention options
- Rabies is 100% fatal

8. External Parasites

- Fairly common problem for dogs
- Include ticks, fleas, and mange
- Can be defined as parasites that live on the outside of the body
- Some external parasites can lead to the transmission of other diseases

9. Fleas

- Parasites that dogs can pick up anywhere, including both inside and out
- Can cause some types of tapeworm
- Symptoms:
 - Intense and frantic scratching and/or biting
 - Excessive grooming and/or hair loss
 - Restlessness
 - "Hot spots"
- Prevention is the first step and this can be done by applying a long-term treatment to skin
- If your dog already has fleas, give them a bath with a flea shampoo
- While treating and washing your dog will help, you also need to clean any environment that your dog has been in, including your car
- Make sure to vacuum all the floors and furniture
- Wash your dog's bed
- Consider using a flea spray or fogger
- Treat your yard with a flea spray, pellet, or nontoxic treatment
- Following this procedure will help you collect the flea eggs, larvae, pupae, and adult fleas

10. Ticks

- While ticks are unsightly and uncomfortable for your dog, they also carry diseases
- This includes tick-borne diseases such as hemobartonellosis, babesiosis, and ehrlichiosis
- They also carry rickettsial diseases such as Lyme disease
- If the infestation is bad enough, the dog can suffer from anemia due to blood loss along with organ failure and death
- Prevention is the best approach and there are many products on the market that kill ticks and/or prevent them from biting
- Make sure to check your dog after spending time outdoors

11. Itch Mite

- Three types:
 - Sarcoptic mange mites
 - Demodectic mange mites
 - Otodectes cynotis

12. Itch Mite: Sarcoptic Mange

- Commonly called scabies or sarcoptic mange
- Highly contagious and can be transferred to humans
- Caused by the *Sarcoptes* mite
- Causes skin lesions, intense itching, hair loss, and skin infections
- Treat by applying miticide
- No prevention

13. Itch Mite: Demodectic Mange

- Caused by microscopic *Demodex* mites that naturally live in canine hair follicles
- Most commonly transmitted from mother to puppies
- Symptoms include hair loss, skin thickening, and skin infections
- Treat by applying miticide
- No prevention

14. Itch Mite: Otodectes Cynotis Mange

- Causes ear mites
- Common condition that is often found in puppies, but any age of dog can be affected
- Ear mites eat the wax and oils in the ear canal
- Causes irritation and discomfort along with head shaking
- Can cause secondary ear infections
- Treat by applying a miticide designed for ear mites

15. Internal Parasites

An internal parasite can be defined as one that lives within the body of the host in the digestive tract, organs, blood, tissue, or cells

16. Tapeworms

- Dogs get tapeworms when they eat fleas, lice, or rodents that are infected with tapeworms
- Can also be spread by fecal matter from an animal that has tapeworms
- Can cause malnutrition
- Prevent by keeping fleas and/or lice off your dog
- Fecal test is required for diagnosis
- Treatment is a dewormer that treats tapeworms

17. Hookworms

- Hookworms are one of two of the most common internal parasites in canines
- Larvae are transmitted through the skin and/or ingested fecal matter in the soil
- Live in the dog's intestinal tract wall with "hooks"
- While in the intestinal wall, they feed on the dog's blood
- Deposit eggs in the intestinal tract where they pass through the system and end as fecal matter
- Signs include blood in stool, anemia, weight loss, and poor coat appearance
- Treatment is deworming and better sanitation practices

18. Roundworms

- Second most common parasite in dogs
- While any age can get roundworms, it is extremely common to find them in puppies
- Mothers who have roundworms will pass them on to their puppies
- Older dogs get roundworms from their environment or while grooming
- Symptoms:
 - Diarrhea
 - Vomiting
 - Weight loss
 - Swollen belly
 - Dehydration
- Lab tests are required to determine if roundworms are present
- Treat by deworming

19. Giardia

- Known as the "Traveler's Diarrhea" in humans
- Parasite
- Transmitted by swallowing a cyst or sniffing one up from contaminated ground or drinking contaminated water
- Contamination comes from cysts in fecal matter from animals with giardia
- Commonly found in areas with lots of dogs, such as kennels, pet stores, and animal shelters
- Foul-smelling diarrhea is a symptom, but a lab test is needed to be sure
- Fenbendazole and metronidazole are used to treat this issue
- Support treatment may be given to prevent dehydration

20. Coccidia

- Commonly found intestinal protozoa
- Transmitted by exposure to affected fecal matter
- Organism can live outside the body for two weeks
- In puppies, it can cause bloody or mucus-coated stools
- In adult dogs, it can cause weight loss, dehydration, and severe diarrhea
- Lab test required for diagnosis
- Normally resolves itself but there is currently one drug in the U.S. that can be used (sulfactimethoxine) for treatment
- How to prevent:
 - Keep everything disinfected
 - Remove fecal matter from the environment
 - Bathe your dog with an antibacterial shampoo

21. Heartworm

- Transmitted from animal to animal by affected mosquitoes
- When the mosquito bites, it transfers larvae to the animal
- Takes six months for the larvae to turn into heartworms
- During the beginning of the infestation, no symptoms are present
- As it progresses, the dog will begin to cough, become very drained, lose appetite, and have difficulty breathing
- Lab test is required for diagnosis
- Can be treated with several drugs depending on the infestation, but the best approach is prevention
- 100% preventable
- Only requires a vaccination

22. Whipworm

- Caused by *Trichuris vulpis*
- This nematode lives in the environment
- Normally diagnosed in older dogs
- There is a treatment for whipworms, but it depends on the severity and takes three months to complete
- Eggs of whipworms are not affected
- Prevention is the best approach
- Pick up dog feces promptly
- Cover sandboxes so that dogs cannot contaminate the area
- Have regular fecal examinations and deworming

- The skeletal system is held together in three ways
- Joints occur where two or more bones meet
- Ligaments are bands of connective tissue that keep bones together
- Tendons are thick bands that connect bone and muscle

5. **What Does the Muscular System Do?**

- Muscles allow the body to move
- Muscles can be either voluntary or involuntary
- Voluntary are muscles the animal consciously controls, such as those in your hand that allow you to write
- Involuntary muscles are those that are not controlled by the animal, such as the heart

6. **Three Types of Muscle**

- Smooth muscles are found in the walls of internal organs and are involuntary
- Cardiac muscles make up the heart and are involuntary
- Skeletal muscles are those attached to the bones and aid in movement
 - They are voluntary

7. **How Does a Dog's Digestive System Work?**

- Digestive system break food down into small molecules so that the body can get nutrition from the food
- Consists of the mouth, tongue, pharynx, esophagus, stomach, small intestine, large intestine, and anus

8. **The Monogastric Omnivores**

Dogs are monogastric omnivores, which means they have one chambered stomach and eat both meat and plants

9. **The Digestive Journey**

- Digestion starts with the dog's mouth, which contains 42 teeth that are sharp and lean
- The reason for this is so that the teeth can tear and chew through an assortment of tough surfaces
- As the dog chews the food, it is mixed with saliva, but unlike other omnivores, this saliva is not the kickoff of digestion
- A dog's saliva does not contain amylase, which is an enzyme or type of protein that helps the body break down carbohydrates
- Because of this, digestion starts in the stomach
- As the chewed food makes its way to the stomach, it is deposited into an environment that contains three digestive enzymes that break down proteins
- These include pepsinogen, trypsin, and chymotrypsin
- These three digestive enzymes combined create an environment that contains 100 times more acid than a human's digestive system
- There are two reasons for this
 1. It speeds up the breakdown of protein

2. The acidic environment makes breaking down bone and grizzly pieces easy
- Once the food is broken down in the stomach, the sloppy, churned up contents move into the small intestines
- The small intestines are broken into three parts
 - The duodenum alkalizes the stomach acid
 - The jejunum, which is covered with tiny microvilli, moves the contents along while absorbing nutrients
 - The last part of the journey through the small intestine is by way of the ileum
- From here, the contents are moved to the large intestine
- The large intestine produces a mucus-based substance that quickens the transportation of waste to the rectum

10. What Does the Endocrine System Do?

- The endocrine system is made up of glands that produce hormones
- Hormones are chemicals that control different types of bodily functions
- There are four glands that create this system

11. A Dog's Glands and Their Uses

- Hypothalamus gland controls the pituitary gland and makes an antidiuretic hormone
- Pituitary gland makes amino acids and releases growth hormone
- Thyroid gland creates amino acids and encourages growth along with metabolism
- Adrenal gland makes amino acids and releases epinephrine and norepinephrine

3. The Last Three Things To Consider When Adopting a Dog

4. Lifestyle

- Activity level is the first lifestyle consideration to think about
- This is about your activity level, not your dog's
- Ask yourself what you like to do at home, such as sitting watching TV or reading a book compared to going on a hike
- If you are more sedentary, then consider adopting an older dog or small breed
- If you are more active, then consider adopting a puppy or adult dog and take a look at huskies, Boxers, Border Collies, or labs
- Next, how much are you home?
- This includes time working and/or out with friends
- If you are not home much, do you have a reliable dog sitter? Can you afford a dog sitter?
- Is there a doggie daycare near your home? Can you afford it?

- Do you have enough free time to take care of a dog?
- This includes time for walks, feeding, and going to the veterinarian once per year
- Do you have kids and/or other pets?
- While it may not make sense, some breeds love to be around kids, but others do not
- When considering kids, think about the age of the children and how well a particular breed deals with young children versus teenagers
- The same holds true for other pets
- Some dogs do well with other dogs or cats, while others do not
- It is important to do your research on the likes and dislikes of the breed you are considering
- If adopting from a shelter, talk to the staff about the temperament of the canine you are interested in
- While guests may not be an issue for you, it may be an issue for your dog and/or guests
- Does the breed you are thinking about getting love to be social and want everyone to play with them or is the breed known to get overwhelmed?
- Make sure you can afford your canine
- This includes costs such as:
 - Food
 - Shelter
 - Toys
 - Veterinarian visits

5. Location

- The next consideration is location
- This includes region and climate
- Are you willing to walk your dog in all types of weather that your area experiences?
- If you live in an area in which going outside is not always possible due to weather, do you have other ways to address exercise and bathroom needs?
- What type of living space will you share with your dog?
- If you live in an apartment, then you should consider a small breed of dog
- If you live in a large house and/or large property, then you have no breed size restrictions, but you do have other things to consider
- Take a look at other animals around your space
- If your neighbor has chickens, that could be a problem depending on the breed
- When looking at the living space, consider both outside and indoors
- Can you or are you willing to put a fence up for your dog?
- Are there stairs inside your house?
- Another question to ask yourself is how attached are you to your furnishing?
- Do you have antique furniture that you do not want scratched up?
- Do you have breakable items sitting on your living room table that you are not willing to put up?
- Sound level is very important
- Take a moment to listen to your home surroundings
- If it is really noisy, then consider adopting a dog that does not have issues with loud noises

- Another question to ask is what activities are around your area that you and your dog could participate in?
- Is there a dog park nearby or are there dog-friendly places to go?
- Are there sidewalks in your area so it is safe to walk your dog to these locations?
- Are the activities that are dog-friendly something you have interest in doing yourself?

6. Temperament

- Temperament has to do with personality
- Dogs are either easygoing and relaxed or high energy and hyper
- When it comes to selecting a dog, you must not only look at the breed's temperament that you have interest in but everyone in the household's personalities

7. The Dog's Temperament

- There are a few simple guidelines to follow when it comes to a dog's temperament
- If you are looking for a family dog, then you will want a dog that is playful and protective
- Good breeds for a family dog include Labrador Retrievers, Beagles, and Irish Setters
- If you are looking for a guard dog, then consider breeds such as German Shepherds and Great Danes
- If you want a working dog, then you are looking for a dog that is alert, strong, and smart
- Working dogs include huskies, Doberman Pinschers, and Australian Shepherds
- Dog training is a way of changing some of a dog's temperament
- However, it is hard to teach an old dog new tricks
- If you want to help mold the behavior of your dog, then adopt a puppy
- If you have experience in dog training and are up for a challenge, consider adopting an older dog from a shelter

8. Human Temperament

- While a dog can be trained, a person's temperament regarding a pet cannot be changed
- If you lose your temper easily and have very little patience, it may be better to just visit friends with dogs and not own one

9. Basics on How to Judge a Dog

- In a dog conformation show, judges are not just comparing the dogs to each other
- They are also comparing the dogs to the "idealized picture" of what that particular breed should look like
- In other words, what the perfect dog would look like according to breed standards

10. Standards for Dog Breeds

- Balance or overall appropriate proportions in size based on breed
- Weight of the canine is evaluated as to whether the dog is too heavy or too light according to breed standards
- Size of dog refers to height and how well it meets the breed requirement
- Eyes are evaluated for color, shape, and size based on breed standards

- The breed's standard for ear shape, length, and position are considered
- Head shape is evaluated and compared to breed standards
- Muzzle is evaluated to make sure that the length and shape meet the breed's requirement
- Thickness of the whiskers according to the breed standard is considered
- During a dog show, a dog's teeth will be examined
- A judge looks for whether the teeth are level or the dog has a scissors bite, which is a breed standard
- A judge will also look at the dog's tail to see how the tail arches and sets on the back
- This evaluation is compared to breed standard
- Shoulders are viewed and the condition of the bone and muscle are compared to breed standard
- Muscles of the legs, how the dog stands, and the proportionality of the legs to the body are evaluated by observing the dog standing and running
- Coat texture and length are considered
- Color of the coat is also considered to see if it fits into the acceptable color range for the breed

11. How Are Dogs Judged At a Dog Show

- A judge will have the owner of the dog walk and run with the dog
- This is to see how the animal carries itself and how it reacts to handling
- Judge also looks at the shoulders and muscles in the legs
- To look at teeth, coat, ears, and eyes, the judge will have the owner "position" the dog in its best stance

12. AKC Judge Requirements

- To be an American Kennel Club (AKC) judge, you must have a minimum of 12 years of experience in the breed you want to judge, which includes having bred and raised at least five litters in your home
- You must also have bred and/or owned four or more champions from those same litters

- Annual salary: \$120,936
- Provides health care to animals
- Can work in a private practice, shelter, or research laboratory
- Primary duties:
 - Diagnosing and treating animal diseases
 - Providing emergency care
 - Prescribing and giving medication
 - Performing medical procedures
 - Giving advice to dog owners
- Pre-veterinarian/bachelor degree plus vet school required
 - Can take 7-9 years to complete this education
- If specialized, such as a canine eye surgeon, education can take longer

2. Veterinary Receptionist

- Annual salary: \$45,930
- Works in a veterinary clinic at the front desk
- Primary duties:
 - Answering the phone
 - Responding to inquiries
 - Scheduling appointments
 - Receiving mail
 - Handling payments
- Needs to understand basic animal care to answer pet owners' questions
- Needs to manage office supplies and inventory
- No postsecondary schooling required

3. Veterinary Nurse

- Annual salary: \$24,064
- Primary duties:
 - Giving animal medications
 - Preparing the animal for surgery and other medical procedures
 - Collecting blood and urine samples
 - Keeping animal records and preparing reports
- May work in an animal hospital or shelter
- Does not require a postsecondary degree, but training is available
- To be recognized, the training must be NAVTA-approved and accredited by ABHES

4. Veterinary Technician

- Annual salary: \$38,789
- Provides assistance to a veterinarian
- Primary duties:
 - Carrying out blood and urine tests
 - Administering vaccines
 - Giving medicine
 - Preparing animals for medical procedures
- Provides emergency first aid and monitors animal vital signs
- While they can work for several years before taking the veterinary technician exam, it is very difficult
- Instead, it is recommended to take a two-year course (associate degree) that is AVMA certified before taking the credentialing exam

5. Dog Trainer

- Annual salary: \$65,667
- Provides behavioral training
- This includes potty training, obedience, and special training, such as bomb detection and rescue operations
- Works with the owner and dog to teach both the required skills
- Uses positive reinforcement, hand signals, and voice commands
- May be self-employed or work for a shelter, clinic, or boarding facility
- No degree required, but they must get a mentor and training experience

6. Dog Groomer

- Annual salary: \$42,703
- Takes care of a dog's appearance
- Brushes, trims, and styles the dog's hair as well as trims the dog's nails and cleans their ears
- While this may not be viewed as keeping up with a dog's appearance, dog groomers examine the skin for cancer and disease along with cleaning the teeth
- There is training available but no college degree
- Having experience is another way into this field

7. Dog Handler

- Annual salary: \$38,077
- Provides care and training to dogs
- Can work in a wide range of fields such as law enforcement for police dogs and in dog shows/pageants
- Duties include developing a training program that addresses the required needs of the dog plus keeping records of the progress
- Maintains the dog's living environment and cares for them, which includes feeding, grooming, and giving medication
- No degree required, but there is training available
- The best way into this field is to combine training with dog handling experience

8. Dog Walker

- Annual salary: \$36,451
- Primary duties:
 - Exercise the dogs
 - Teach the dogs how to socialize with other dogs
 - Clean up their elimination (waste)
 - Return them in good condition to their owner(s)
- May also feed the dogs and report injury or unusual behavior to the owner(s)
- No training available, but experience is a plus

9. Animal Control

- Annual salary: \$28,982
- Primary duties include enforcing animal safety laws and making sure animals are treated humanely in their jurisdiction
- Other responsibilities:
 - Investigate animal abuse claims
 - Rescue endangered and trapped animals
 - Capture dangerous animals
 - Care for the animals they have in their custody
- Beyond caring for animals, they must keep incident reports and testify in court
- No college degree or training required

10. Animal Caretaker

- Annual salary: \$32,092
- Works in shelters, pet shops, kennels, research facilities, and clinics
- Primary duties:
 - Feeding the animals
 - Keeping their environment clean
 - Walking them
 - Grooming them
 - Giving medication when needed
- Beyond basic care duties, animal caretakers must keep records that include:
 - Feeding schedule
 - Treatment records
 - Entry and exit records
 - Any other records required to show the status of each animal at any time
- No college degree required, but proven experience is important

11. Kennel Owner/Assistant

- While the salary for a kennel owner can vary depending on the size of the kennel and number of dogs, a kennel assistant can expect to earn around \$29,524 per year
- Primary duties:
 - Cleaning cages
 - Bathing dogs
 - Grooming dogs
 - Feeding dogs
 - Giving them medicine

- May also exercise and train the dogs
- There is no degree, but experience is very valuable

12. Doggie Daycare and/or Spa

- Annual salary depends on if you are the owner or assistant
- Annual salary for an assistant: \$31,528
- A strict doggie daycare is a place where owners take their dogs during the day
- Responsibilities include feeding, walking, and keeping the animals safe
- They may also provide training
- A doggie spa is a place where the owner takes their dog to relax and get groomed
- Spas can provide:
 - Doggie massage
 - Special fur treatment
 - Special food prep
 - Manicures
- Basic canine first aid is required by some daycare businesses and dog grooming training is required for spas

13. Dog Breeder

- Annual salary: \$38,038
- Mates dogs with certain traits to produce puppies with those desired characteristics
- Normally sticks to one breed
- Provides basic care to the dogs and offers assistance during the gestation and birthing process
- Primary duties:
 - Cleans kennels and cages
 - Feeds the dogs
 - Grooms the dogs
 - Gives medicine when needed
- Must keep records of breeding and birth records, help with insemination, and work with vets to keep the dogs healthy
- Animal science classes are helpful but not required
- Having a successful track record of Grand Champions is very important

14. Pet Insurance Agent

- Annual salary is dependent on how much insurance you sell
- While some companies do not require a four-year degree, it is a good idea to earn one
- Important topics to understand:
 - Business management
 - Finance
 - Economics
 - Risk management
 - Communication
 - Marketing
- Must be licensed to sell pet insurance
- Can work for a company that sells all forms of insurance or one that specializes in pet insurance
- Works in an office
